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





The text is illustrated by 390 images, all in color, and close to 1,500 color images on the exclusively accessed pdf which represent structural and decorative elements from a variety of bindings made before 1900. The book's focus on primarily non-luxury bindings adds depth

to an often-neglected segment of the history of bookbinding. Preservation is at the heart of "Books Will Speak Plain." We have already lost too many historical bindings because their importance was not understood and appreciated. This book is a call to action to urge custodians of every kind of historical book collection, public and private, to assess the physical character of the historical bindings in their care and record the changes that have accrued to those bindings during their passage through time. Science gave him the test and aim of all that he regarded as good work, and the esteem of scientific men was the only honor that his ambition welcomed or would accept.
